













Your Questions

Safety Online:

This week we have been asked about keeping our children safe online. We are currently going through a very challenging time, where our routines have changed dramatically; we are not in school seeing our friends and having our usual interactions, we are not mixing with other family members that we might usually see, and we may have reduced contact overall with others. This could make us feel lonely and a little isolated. Luckily, to help us with this, we have the wonderful world of social media! Using our electronic devices allows us to remain in contact with others.



When used appropriately and safely, it's a great way for our children to feel up to date with the world around them and have a positive impact on their social, emotional and mental wellbeing. However, we are very aware that the online world can cause confusion for children with a diagnosis of Autism and there can be situations that arise within the world of technology, that some children find difficult to manage.

Parent Information:

We know how tricky it can be to monitor what our children can access online. Here are some simple tips to get started:

- Keep computers in family rooms
- Use parental guidance locks
- Install a virus detector
- Talk to your child- navigate sites with them
- Use routines to have allocated computer time and manage time spent online using timers/symbols etc

- **Do not** give out your personal details: such as your full name, address or school
- **Keep** your password safe
- **Do not** speak to strangers online and do not agree to meet with them
- **Check** with your parents before downloading apps, emails or files
- **Check** with your parents before posting pictures online
- **Talk** to your parents if someone online has upset you
